MBLETON

As the Government freezes the easing of lockdown and we continue in our 'new normal' the Parish Council would like to thank all those adhering to social distancing guidelines to the best of their ability. The guidelines and announcements seem haphazard and unclear but the main message remains the same - keep your distance from others - if that is impossible, such as in shops and on pubic transport, wear a mask. The fact remains that coronavirus need a body to survive, as far as possible we have to make sure we do not freely offer our own bodies to allow the continuation and spread of the virus.

As restrictions are eased and we can see more of family and friends, we thank you for staying alert and continuing to keep our community safe.

<u>A63</u>

The Parish Council have been in continued talks with North Yorkshire County Council Highways about speeding on the road and the need for a crossing. On 23rd June the NYFPCC announced that applications could be made to the 'AJ1 Project Road Safety Fund', money raised from the sale of the number plate 'AJ1'. It was immediately added to the July agenda for discussion because Councillors believed it could help to convince Highways to install a crossing, despite being told on 12th March when requesting a new Risk Assessment of the road that:

"Funding is only allocated for investigation of sites by Traffic Engineers where there is an actual need to improve safety and reduce personal injury and as there is no collision history this is not a priority site" and

"...the site does not meet criteria for a permanent facility at this moment in time" and

"...the location would still need to meet the criteria irrespective of who is funding it"

On 16th July at the PC meeting it was agreed to create a focused committee of councillors who would write the funding bid, the committee members are Cath Protheroe and Jeff Bramley who had already conducted surveys on the road to collect data to back up the need for a crossing, and also Mike Dunne who has been involved with the Highways department throughout his career. Following the dreadful news of a child being hit by a car on Main Road on 20th July,

Highways have attended a site meeting with District Councillor Pearson and Richard Sim (Parish Council Chairman) and agreed to arrange assessments for the viability of a crossing.

The community have come together and formed a <u>Road</u> <u>Safety Action Group</u> on Facebook and the PC will be appointing a councillor as an official liaison at the 3rd August meeting to ensure the group and the council can work together efficiently to get the village the crossing it needs. **Find out more about the group on page 7.**

The Parish Council wish a speedy recovery to Neo and continue to work on the funding bid whilst awaiting the findings of the NYCC assessments.

PARK & RECREATION AREA

The Parish Council were able to re-open play equipment at the park and open air gym at the recreation area for people to enjoy. The equipment underwent a maintenance check and a clean and the areas now have signage as recommended by the government. Please do not enter these areas if you have symptoms. Take your own hand sanitiser and remember to keep your distance from those not in your 'bubble'.

Repairs to fencing around the MUGA were quoted at £2390 - this was **mindless vandalism** - please respect the facilities provided. The Parish Council have agreed to install CCTV.



BAG DISPENSERS

The Parish Council have provided dog waste bag dispensers at four points in the village so there really is no excuse for not cleaning up after your dog. Matt Pearson, of Core Groundworks, and his 5 year old son Louie (on work experience!) kindly installed them at Old Lane, Hough Lane, Common Lane and Station Road.

The document is entitled "Lifting Lockdown, Tips from a GP" by Dr Farhana Rahman, and the main section highlights how 'Easing Lockdown' does not mean 'Back to Normal' and it also provides a COVID-19 Toolkit. This guidance does not replace the government guidelines. Sadly the document is far too long to reproduce here but a small extract from the introduction is written below:

"As we work towards rebuilding some much-needed levels of normality back into our lives, we can empower ourselves with knowledge and safer practice whilst staying mindful that the risk is not evenly spread in society. In this way we can protect ourselves and each other.

The virus has not gone away and the following truths remain unchanged:

- Your body is just as susceptible to catching the virus as before.
- The virus is just as capable of making you very sick/causing death as before.
- The virus itself is just as contagious as it was before.
- There is no effective treatment.
- There is no vaccination.
- If the spread increases, the virus can put us back into lockdown again.
- However, knowing your risks, how to manage them and how to engage with policies to control the

virus can help us to move forward together and fight fear head on.

H.i.H.G. GOVERNMENT GUIDANCE HIGHLIGHTS

n the 17th July the Government issued guidance on how to **meet people from outside your household** which can be found at <u>https://www.gov.uk/guidance/</u> <u>meeting-people-from-outside-your-household-from-</u> <u>4-july.</u>

Listed below are just a few of the subjects covered and a small amount of information. There is far too much information to be able to reproduce here.

FACE COVERINGS should be worn on **public transport** and in **shops** from 24th July. It is advised you wear them in any space where social distancing will be difficult. There are exemptions which can be found on the website.

Where to meet indoors

- Members of 2 different households can meet in any indoor space, including a private home (anyone in your support bubble counts as one household). Anyone in your support bubble counts as one household.
- You should, wherever possible, socially distance from people you do not live with or who are not in your support bubble and take particular care to maintain excellent hygiene washing hands and surfaces when using shared facilities like bathrooms.

Where to meet outdoors

- You can meet people in both public and private outdoor spaces, such as gardens, yards or roof terraces – but you should maintain social distancing at all times with people who are not in your household or support bubble. Garages, sheds or cabins are all indoor areas where the risk of transmission is as high as if you were in a small room in a house.
- If you do need to use the toilet in someone's home or are passing through to access someone's garden, try to avoid touching surfaces and if you use the toilet wash your hands thoroughly, wipe down surfaces, use separate towels or paper towels and wash or dispose of them safely after use.

Going to a pub or restaurant with members of another household

- When eating or drinking out with people you do not live with, you should only meet one other household if you are seated indoors.
- If you are eating or drinking outdoors, you can do so with one other household or in a group of up to 6 people from different households.

You should take care to limit your interactions with anyone outside the group you visit these places with.

In all cases, people from different households (unless in support bubbles) should ensure they socially distance as much as possible. Premises should also take reasonable steps to help you do so in line with COVID-19 secure principles.

Sharing food and drink

You should try, wherever possible, not to pass each other food or drink unless you live together or are in a support bubble together. You should ensure that plates or utensils are thoroughly cleaned before use. Wash your hands frequently and thoroughly for at least 20 seconds and use disposable towels if possible

Using garden equipment

- You should not share garden equipment with people outside of your household or your support bubble because of the risk of transmission from shared surfaces. You could bring your own equipment or if you have to use chairs, for example, you should wipe them down carefully with household cleaner before and after use.
- You should try to avoid shared equipment. For example you should use your own tennis racquet, golf club or basketball. Any equipment that is used should be cleaned frequently. Cleaning should be particularly thorough if it is to be used by someone else.
- You should avoid using paddling pools and private swimming pools with people outside of your household or support bubble.

Playing sport

- The government has published guidance on how team sports can restart safely.
- Sports governing bodies are developing tailored guidance outlining how their sport can be conducted safely, which will be reviewed by Public Health England. People should follow the approved guidance when playing team sports.

Group prayer

Places of worship can open for services and group prayer, but should operate in compliance with COVID-19 secure guidelines.

As the majority of you will already be aware, a child was hit by a car whilst crossing the A63 at the refuge island. The child suffered a broken foot, hand and head injuries along with cuts and bruises. Fortunately, they were not life threatening and he was released from hospital and is recovering at home. Moments earlier and we could have been looking at a fatality. The police have said they have put a road traffic certificate in for the road, which we are trying to find out what that means. We are aware that many attempts have been made over the years to try persuade NYCC to provide a safe method to cross the road, such as a pelican crossing. These requests have not only been made by the Parish Council but also by individual households and whilst they have done a superb job in managing to get road markings and signage, the request for a pelican crossing has been refused. This incident has inspired talented and passionate individuals to come forward and support the quest to make Hambleton safer for all. The Parish council have, as the name suggests, the whole of the Parish to look after and by the community creating a specialist committee will allow more time and focus to be applied to this one project. We anticipate working in close contact with the Parish in order to benefit from the hard work already undertaken by them.

From forming the group, we had almost 400 join us in two days, showing that the village wants action. Endless comments have been received relating to speed, dangerous driving and accidents. Much of this has gone unreported. But now, members of our team are collating additional information to compliment the data we already hold from previous efforts, to put together a compelling case. As we move forward we will continue to keep you informed and plan to hold a monthly meeting open to all residents to keep you up to date with the latest information.

The journey wont be short, but a positive outcome will be worth waiting for.

COMMITTEE and VOLUNTEERS



Hambleton History Lives





Prior to 1834 the only way to travel between Leeds and Selby was by road, the Pigot's Yorkshire Directory 1834 included and advertisement of the stage coach leaving from the Bull & Mouth on Briggate at 0500, which included a stop in Hambleton arriving in time to catch the packets (boat) to Hull.

Hambleton Railway Station was opened 22nd September, 1834 when the LNER (London North Eastern Railway) opened the Leeds Selby line which was built to compete with the Aire and Calder Navigation. The first train left Marsh Lane Leeds at 0630 and was hauled by locomotive Nelson and arrived in Selby for 0900. Whether any of the villages went to watch this event we will probably never know. By 15th December the line was fully opened for goods as well as passenger services. However the station masters house was not built until a few years later as there was an advertisement in the Northern Echo in October and November 1836 for a tender to build the house.

In 1839 the Selby line was linked to the York & North Midland Railway at Milford junction. There was a fatal train crash just outside the station on 5th May, 1853 at 2330 the Express Train from London arrived at Hambleton but tragedy struck as it left the station the engine left the track killing John Thompson driver and Joseph Sykes stoker.

A timetable in 1857 for the North Eastern Railway York to Hull service showed that it called at Hambleton at 8.17, 1.45, 5.10, 7.50 and 1030.

In 1875 an excursion train was run for the Yorkshire Exhibition of Arts & Manufacturers in Leeds, the outward fare for a 3rd class journey was 2s 0d and the return 1s 6d, children between 3 and 12 years could travel half price.

The train was used to transport goods from Hambleton to Selby for many years. Anson Brothers in the early 1900s advertised that their goods would be transported by train and empties could be returned to Hambleton Station. School children from Hambleton who went to Selby or Drax used to use the train. School and Sunday school trips also travelled by train which enabled trips to places like Bridlington and Scarborough.

Farmers also used the train and one of the oral histories includes a memory of collecting cattle from the station and walking them up station road and sometimes down the main road to the farm. Delivering sugar beet or potatoes to the station in winter was sometimes very difficult as it involved backing the trailer with the small tractor up the ramps which could be icy and if you skidded there was nothing to stop you falling onto the track!

The station closed to passengers on the 14th September 1959 and to freight on 7th September, 1964 and the building and platforms have long since disappeared.

GATEFORTH HOSPITAL, HAMBLETON

I imagine some of you may well be saying 'oh no it's not.' I ask you then to look at the picture of the hospital clearly stating *Gateforth Hospital Hambleton*. I can well remember in 1969 being called out to this hospital, the address I was given was *Gateforth Hospital Hambleton, near Selby*. It may well be that the easiest way to get to the hospital was via the A63 at Hambleton – that was the way I found it in 1969. The

For Sale by Auction in Thirteen Lots THURSDAY, 29th JANUARY, 1981 road from Hambleton via the Hough was still used to get to the Hall into the 2000's.

The building ceased to be used as a hospital in the 1970's, I don't know the precise date or how much it was sold for, but in 1981 it was on offer again for 25 thousand pounds – and that included 11 acres of land. The building was started in 1812, that's the year when *Napoleon Bonaparte* was being kicked out of Russia.

It's easy to find the history of this amazing building on the internet – it has had many different roles. My youngest daughter held her wedding reception at Gateforth Hall in 1997 and at that time it was also functioning as a hotel. My wife and I stayed there in a beautiful room. I never thought in 1969 that I would end up living so near to this grand building and see it nearly every day. Maybe one day I will get the opportunity to have a

look around the old place again...

Wilbys Lane Fox & Partners Gateforth Church was just past The Hough at the start of the bridle path. It was demolished in 1948 and was deconsecrated by a senior cleric from York. The private residence, Church Lodge, was left standing when the church was demolished. After Leeds Corporation took over Gateforth Hall and turned it into a hospital, the church fell gradually out of use and started to decay – some of the building and artefacts apparently ended up at Hambleton Church. I enclose some pictures of the church (*not easy to find*) one of which shows the church in a sorry state

prior to demolition. Under the church, where the pulpit stood, is the family vault of the Osbaldeston family. This vault was sealed after the demolition in 1948.

The Parsonage in Gateforth Lane Hambleton was the result of a generous



gift by Theodosa Brooke Osbaldeston, the daughter of Humphrey Osbaldeston, in 1834 – it cost her £2,000. Theodosa was the daughter of Humphrey who had Gateforth Hall built. This parsonage became the home of the Curates of Gateforth Church, they were only Parsons of Gateforth Church despite the fact that they lived in Hambleton. It became The Vicarage when the new Parish of 'Gateforth and Hambleton' was created in 1915. The building is now a private residence.

Gateforth and Hambleton have some ties...



During lockdown the floor has been polished, it looks fantastic, and there has been a paint job in the main hall which really freshens up the look of the hall. The trustees will continue to make their way through the hall's to-do list!

CONTROL MEASURES:

hand sanitiser dispensers at the front door, in the kitchen and in the main hall.

- sanitising spray and blue roll to clean surfaces, touch points and equipment before and after use.
- smaller lidded pedal bins; we will need you to **empty the bins** you have used after your session into the large external in.
- The external bin is now emptied weekly, and our cleaning contractors are paying specific attention to sanitising all the touch points such as switches and handles.
- Each group leader must have contact details of people attending their session for **Track and Trace** purposes and management must have contact details for the group leader.
- Our COVID -19 Risk Assessment includes control measures your group can implement to reduce the risk of spreading the second control

disease.










NEWS FROM ST. MARY'S CHURCH

Important Announcement!



We are pleased to announce that from July 19th, St Mary's Church will be open for Public Worship when we plan to have a short service of quiet prayer at

3.30pm. This feels like a very big step, especially after so many weeks of lockdown. Going into lockdown felt strange, but I think many of us eventually got used to it. Human beings are very adaptable – that's one of the main reasons there are so many of us! However, coming out of lockdown is so much more complicated!

We have had to make some changes to the way we run St Mary's so we can do our best to keep people safe. To comply with social distancing guidelines, we will be able to welcome 23 people to services at a time. Please do feel welcome, but if more people arrive we will ask you to return on a different Sunday. There will be a one way system in place in church, and there will be help on hand if you find it confusing. We've tried our best to make it straightforward. There will be hand sanitiser, which we will ask you to use on your way in and out. Sadly, we aren't allowed to sing in church yet. There will be new service leaflets which we will ask you to keep and bring with you when you come again.

St Mary's has been deep cleaned in preparation for re-opening and we are really looking forward to starting up again.

We plan to have services of Holy Communion at 9.15 on July 26th, August 1st and August 8th.

We will continue to make recorded services available for those unable to come to church. We plan to record the services as they happen in church and then make them available after the event.

We plan also to be ready to offer the church for funeral services, though numbers will be limited to 30, 30 is better than the 10 currently allowed at crematoria. We will not be able to sing, but we will be able to remember loved ones together and commend them to God.

Baptisms and weddings will also be possible, subject to similar restrictions on numbers. So, if you would like to arrange a funeral, wedding or baptism, please do get in touch:
